


MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Hopefully our Commercial Fishermen will be celebrating at the end of the year too. At the moment they are looking down the barrel of being shut down with gill net fishing bans. While it's not council policy to favour one industry or business over others I think the implications to our economy here in the Gulf and North Qld generally, require us to get on the bus and start vocalising support for the industry. Anyone with political connections in state or federal should be chewing their ears off right now. When you start to add up all the support industries such as Freight, Groceries, Fuel, Outboards, Maintenance in general to name a few, it doesn't take long to see the hole that is going to be left, if and when they pack up and go. The fishery is sustainable, and the facts are there to prove it. The fishermen have self-managed their industry for many years and invested a heap of time and money into the

hatchery and restocking programme. They also bought licenses over a period to limit numbers in the Gulf. The biggest threat to any fishery and

When you consider the damage to our turtle population and other species caused by feral pigs in the Gulf you could wonder whether all our scientists and officials in Canberra are on drugs or something stronger than coffee.

Your Mayor, Deputy Mayor and CEO travelled to Winton last week to another Western Qld Alliance meeting. The highlight was probably the fact that the Treasurer Jim Chalmers and Qld senator Anthony Chisolm made it to Winton. After much checking of records, it was decided that Winton has never had a Federal Treasurer ever come to town. Your mayor lost his way a bit and got side-tracked with our fishing industry problems up here but luckily others took up the cry for better funding deals and more surety of funding. While they were very attentive and sympathetic it was obvious that they won't be rocking the party mantra any time soon.

While I personally, am still coming to terms with climate change (or evolution) we did have a very interesting presentation at the last NWQROC meeting. It was a study carried out by JCU and Southern Gulf NRM group. The findings are interesting if not disturbing with the bottom line being, whilst summer temperatures are not increasing by any great margins, the winter temperatures are. Everyone knows that you need cold snaps to ripen and sweeten your fruit and vegies but when you have mild winters, that doesn't happen. This has been evolving for a long time now and suddenly the failed tomato crop or scrawny carrot patch could have a reason. I guess time will tell but in the future we are going to have to have some serious conversations

regarding shade for people, animals and other plant life. Maybe governments will bring funding deals into their drought strategies to be used for protection from the elements.

On a lighter note, I think its time we acknowledged the work our local "Refuse Operations Officer" (how about that for a title) has been doing out at the tip. Some parts of it are so clean and tidy that you almost feel guilty about chucking your rubbish out and spoiling the look. Many visitors often comment on the landscaping etc so full credit to Danny for turning what could be a tedious job into a challenge and succeeding in a way never seen before. Visitors in general, always comment on the tidiness and friendliness of our towns too, so well done to our residents also.

I guess everyone has seen the "We are One" monument adjacent to the Cenotaph by now. It is worth reading the plaque at the bottom to get an understanding of why and how. Again it was a funded project provided to celebrate the work done by the "Nackeroos" during the War. Made up of stockmen of both Aboriginal and European descent, they were basically our northern eyes of Australia, and by necessity a tough bunch who could live off the land forever if necessary. They will be the centre of attention on Remembrance Day so don't forget the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

News for Karumba is the foreshore protection rock has been ordered and as soon as trucks become available carting will start. The material is coming from Cloncurry and Croydon so it should be all here well before Christmas regardless of storms etc.

While we are still in Karumba it was good to see a big roll up to the Karumba Lodge last night for the fishing comp conclusion. There were some surprised faces when it came to the prizes but over all a very successful and enjoyable weekend



was had by all. Again, well done Kyra and full respect for your dedication to the littlies of the town.

Lillyvale is finally on the market. It is an anticlimax moment for us, but the mayor and councillors are relieved that it has happened after all this time and cross our fingers that there is still interest out there.

There is a fair bit happening next week with our council meeting in Karumba on Wednesday 11th and then community consultation at the Civic Centre that same evening from 5.30pm to 7.00pm. On Thursday 12th there will be one in Normanton again from 5.30pm to 7.00pm. It integrates State, regional and local planning matters and will provide a framework for regulating new development throughout the whole of the local government area.




