Like the UNDARA LAVA TUBES, where you can explore the inner workings of an erupted volcano from 190,000 years ago. Once you've taken in the incredible sights and activities of the Gulf Country, spelled out further in this guide, you can continue along the Savannah Way all the way to Broome in the north region of Western Australia. 



At its most northern reach,

NORTH TO THE CAPE

Gulf Country offers a multitude of experiences. Relaxed. Soulful. Rugged. Peaceful. But up here on the way to the Cape is where you can live a little extreme, and a lot off-grid.

If you're a keen angler, you'll discover some amazing jump-off points for exhilarating fishing adventures.

You really can't go wrong up here; our fishing and crabbing charter operators have access to the greatest shallow deep-water fishing on offer.

The Norman River and weir is a great haven for the famous barramundi, cherabin (freshwater prawns) and red claw crayfish.



The grins are bigger up here.



If you just love the idea of taking the 4WD to where the "Outback meets the sea", anywhere north of KARUMBA is a great place to map out some escapades and do some serious camping.





It's 34 degrees. And you've got chills.

That's the kind of effect the awe-inspiring natural beauty of the Gulf can have on a visitor. Locals might be used to it but our travelling friends are often overwhelmed by the sheer wonders of our natural environment.





Bird watchers (please ... let's call them by their real name ... twitchers) could hardly find a better place to spend a few days, particularly if you come at the right time of the year for the migrations.

Jabirus, brolgas, pelicans, waterbirds, parrots, egrets, cranes, kingfishers, finches and eagles are among the hundreds of species you can spot here.

Birding is popular in the Gulf's many wetlands, including mangroves, saltpans, billabongs, creeks or coastlines. These areas are not just for the binocular crowd but also for those who love hiking in beautiful surrounds, enjoying all the flora and fauna on show. And, of course, the fishing is world class, especially for those who love to chase the big barramundi and the king salmon.

While Mother Nature has certainly left her mark up here, you don't have to be a full-on naturalist to appreciate it. Rather, you will find the endless skies, lands and sea will envelope you in their warmth and soothe your soul.

Australia's most famous explorer duo Burke and Wills made it up this far not long before reaching their ultimate demise. There were the gold rush times, with Normanton and Croydon hosting many optimistic prospectors. Or the colonial merchant era, evidenced now by the famous Burns Philp building in the centre of town. Even the old Normanton Gaol tells secrets of the Gulf's penal past.

History and stories abound in this unassuming rustic town, and as a visitor, it's all there for you to soak up at your leisure.



Normanton Station & Gulflander Train

Still regarded as an architectural marvel to this day, the town's railway station boasts historic significance. An on-site museum is worth a tour, or you can even take an overnight trip to Croydon on the incredible Gulflander train.

Connecting Croydon and Normanton, The Gulflander is a train journey that can take you back in time and infuse you with the spirit of our pioneers.

Affectionately known as the "Tin Hare" that rolls along from "nowhere to nowhere", The Gulflander is a nostalgic way to meander through parts of the Gulf, spotting wildlife and rugged sights along the way.

A range of different experiences and options are on offer to make your journey one to remember forever. The Gulflander train runs from Croydon to Normanton from May to October.





Krys, The Savannah King Croc

Normanton's most iconic landmark is a replica of the largest crocodile ever killed or captured in Australia.

Polish immigrant Krystyna 'Krys' Pawlowski shot and killed an 8.63m monster croc on the banks of the Norman River in 1957.



Heritage town walk & The Purple Pub

Normanton's heritage walk takes visitors on a journey through the town's rich history, from the gold rush era to its role as a gateway to the Gulf. Afterward, stop by The Purple Pub, a local icon with its vibrant exterior, the perfect spot to unwind with a drink and hear tales from friendly locals.



Burns Philp Building

Built in 1884, this colonial masterpiece is heritage listed and the oldest surviving outpost of the shipping and merchant company.

It now houses the Visitor Information Centre (come and say hi), library, and the Indigenous Stock Workers and Rodeo Riders displays.



The Big Barramundi

Standing proudly in the heart of Normanton, the Big Barramundi statue is a tribute to the town's rich fishing heritage. This impressive sculpture offers visitors not only a fantastic photo opportunity but also a chance to connect with the spirit of the region and the icon that is the barramundi.



Best spots for birdwatching

During the monsoonal period of November to April, few places in the world can match the **MUTTONHOLE WETLANDS** for migratory birdlife as it comes alive with hundreds of species.

Beyond the wetlands, twitchers can take a walk from their accommodation in Normanton to the **SCHOOL DAM** precinct.

For bike riders, this wetland precinct includes a range of walk and cycleways as well as a pump track for the young at heart. Take a BBQ or picnic lunch and enjoy the migratory bird life from one of the secret bird hides or banks of the dam.



Burke and Wills Camp 119

The famous settler explorer duo Burke and Wills reached the Gulf in 1861.

Just 30km outside Normanton on the Savannah Way lies the site of a campground, known as Camp 119, made famous by the intrepid explorers.

Their well-known fate was met not long after turning back south.

This historic spot continues to attract history enthusiasts and adventurers retracing the steps of Australia's early pioneers.



Festivals, shows, events and more


Normanton has an annual calendar of events including fishing competitions, rodeos, street parades, sprint and spring races, markets and more.

Les Wilson Barramundi Discovery Centre

Visit the only hatchery in the world that breeds the genetically distinct Southern Gulf Barramundi, the Les Wilson Barramundi Discovery Centre & Hatchery.

The Barra Centre contributes toward sustainable barramundi fishing in the Gulf by breeding thousands of fingerlings for release into the wild every year. From humble beginnings, it started life in the hands of professional fishers who set out to secure the future of the fishing industry.

Visitors are invited to experience the story of Australia's most-loved sport and eating fish in a world-class, architecturally designed building that reflects the barramundi form. Want to get closer? You can!
Hand-feed 'Norma' and her friends during
an informative session on the lifecycle of
the barramundi and learn some quirky facts
about the species, as well as best-practice
recreational fishing tips.





Boat cruises

Embark on a tour with one of the many operators offering recreational fishing, crabbing, crocodile spotting and bird watching.

A must-do experience is a twilight cruise to Sand Island where you can savour fresh Gulf prawns paired with your favourite drink—a serene way to end the day!



Heritage walk

Explore the Karumba heritage walk, a picturesque 4km path that weaves through the town's rich heritage, offering scenic vistas and close encounters with wildlife.

Along the way, interpretive signs bring the region's past to life, making it a journey of discovery for nature and history enthusiasts alike.



Karumba Point Beach

The only beach in the Gulf of Carpentaria accessible by bitumen road. It's the perfect spot to watch the sunset, enjoy a picnic or cast out a line ... it's a little bit of magic.




Sunsets to behold



Festivals, shows, events, competitions and more
















Morning Glory natural phenomena

It's hard to describe. But then, it would be, considering this is one of the rarest natural phenomena in the world. Spectacular would be one word.


The Morning Glory clouds are the little-known cousins of the Arcus Cloud family. There are only a few isolated places around the world where you can see the Morning Glory clouds, and here in the Gulf is the only place in Australia where they can be observed.

When conditions are right, what you'll witness is a massive band of cloud that stretches across the horizon.

Some say it looks like a massive roll of cotton wool moving across the low sky. All we can say is that it has to be seen to be believed.

September to November is generally the most likely time for the Morning Glory clouds to appear, when two different sea breezes collide.

Viewing is best between Karumba and Burketown, although nothing really beats getting airborne in a chopper, glider or light plane to see this magnificent natural phenomenon up close.





"Where the Outback meets the sea" may not sound like a place where you'll find waterfalls, but like we say, the Gulf is full of surprises.

Not far from Karumba and south of Burketown are these lovely falls about 50km from the mouth of the Leichhardt River.

Throughout the year, a visit to the Leichhardt Falls is always worth your while. Whether they're gushing or gurgling, these falls are truly a lovely spot.

A terrific place to camp, but no matter what anyone says, don't go swimming here. Saltwater crocs live here and a reminder ... they have legs so they can get to the top of waterfalls as well!

BEST TIME TO VISIT

Wet season: November - April



Muttonhole Wetlands

During the monsoonal period of November to April, few places in the world can match this area for migratory birdlife as it comes alive with hundreds of species.

See jabirus, brolgas, pelicans, cranes and more gather, breed and feed in a truly spectacular landscape.

The sight and sound of these birds in such abundance is nothing short of breathtaking.

A mix of mangrove and grasslands creates a vibrant environment for the birds and other wildlife.

Be warned that crocs are attracted to other wildlife so all precautions need to be taken.

BEST TIME TO VISIT

Wet season: November - April



Drive

Several well-established roadways make their way to the Gulf, including the **SAVANNAH WAY** from Cairns and the **MATILDA WAY** that traverses through Queensland from south to north (and vice-versa).

Most roads are sealed all the way, but there are some unsealed roads around **KARUMBA** and **NORMANTON** if you choose to get off the beaten track. Roadways generally have phone reception in and around towns.

Road safety tips

If you're travelling by road, all the commonsense tips apply. These include:

- · Service your vehicle
- Plot and map your itinerary and familiarise yourself with Outback landscapes and roads
- · Pack essentials and emergency gear
- · Check travel and road conditions
- Be aware of road trains and wide loads
- Avoid dawn, dusk and night driving when wildlife graze by roadsides



Wildlife safety tips

When in the Gulf, extra consideration for wildlife is important. For example, brolgas are very slow to take off from approaching vehicles so **slow down as much as possible**.

Council runs coordinated 1080 (chemical poison) baiting programs between June and October each year for wild dogs and feral pigs, so always **keep your dog on a leash** if out on rural lands.

Don't swim in the wetlands, rivers or beaches – the crocs like people.
