I was told by a couple of people that my speech was a good one so at the risk of being lazy I'll share the main part of it again in this newsletter because I think it's time, we as a nation started calling bad behaviour and a whole host of other things out

It seems, we are not allowed to think for ourselves anymore because we may upset somebody or some group who haven't done anything with their lives except to moan about having less than their neighbour or family and friends. As time goes on it is becoming more and more important that we pull and work together. Maybe Carpentaria can show the rest of Australia how to do it.
